Dear Sir/Madam,

Greeting from LBSNAA!

1. As you may be aware, the National Academy of Administration was founded in 1959 with the merger of the IAS Training School in Metcalfe House, Delhi and the IAS Staff College in Shimla. Though more than five decades have passed since the Academy moved to occupy the precincts of Charleville, there has been no formal documentation and showcasing of the history and achievements of the academy.
2. As a step in this direction, we propose to use a newly refurbished heritage building to house a museum at the Academy. This would aim to showcase the administrative traditions of Civil Services and the contribution of the Academy.
3. For this purpose, an Advisory Board was set up comprising of eminent art historian, former and currently serving IAS officers. The Advisory Board agreed that the broad theme of the museum should capture the essence of the civil services tradition and showcase the role of the Academy. A brief concept note is enclosed for your reference.
4. Since your Institute forms part of the larger umbrella of the Civil Services in India it could prove very useful in bringing out rich administrative traditions of civil services over ages. We seek the assistance and support of your institution in setting up of the Museum of the Academy by way of sharing with LBSNAA any historically important material or information available with your institute. Additionally, if the information about the setting up of the museum at LBSNAA could be shared with alumni and current trainees of the institute, they might like to contribute individually, by way of artefacts or information.

5. I, therefore request you to look into the matter and share with us any information/records available with you which would be relevant for the museum of the Academy.

Concept Note on setting up a Museum at

The Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie (LBSNAA)

Background

The Academy is the premier training institution for the senior civil services in the country. It is responsible for imparting professional training at induction level and mid-career training to members of the IAS as well as conducting a common Foundation Course for direct recruits to the All-India Services and Central Services. The Academy was founded on September 1, 1959 by amalgamating the IAS Training School at Metcalfe House, Delhi and IAS Staff College at Shimla.

Need

The Academy has contributed to nation-building in independent India by imparting quality training to generations of civil servants including induction and mid-career training to IAS. It is important that the history and living traditions of the Academy are captured for posterity through a museum that may inspire coming generations of civil servants as well as showcase the achievements of the Academy as an important public institution of the country.

Building

The Academy has completed reconstruction of the Old Language Block located just above the Director's Lawns. Given its central and vantage location as well as its period architectural character, it is well-suited to be converted into a museum of the Academy. The building has a carpet area of around 2000 ft, excluding toilets. It has wooden flooring, aesthetic lighting and is centrally heated.

Advisory Board

The Academy constituted an Advisory Board comprising former civil servants to conceptualize the envisaged museum, select the exhibits and oversee the execution of the work. The Academy will provide financial, technical and administrative support to the project. The members of the Advisory Board (as included from time to time) are as follows:

Later, it was decided to nominate Dr. Jyotindra Jain and Shri Pankaj Rag, IAS, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs, GOI into the Advisory Board.

Thematic coverage

The Advisory Board agreed that the broad concept behind setting up a museum was to showcase the administrative tradition of the civil service (including the IAS). The Advisory Board decided that the museum may be curated on the broader theme of systems of administration in India which would subsume the tradition of the civil service as well as the contribution of the Academy.
